

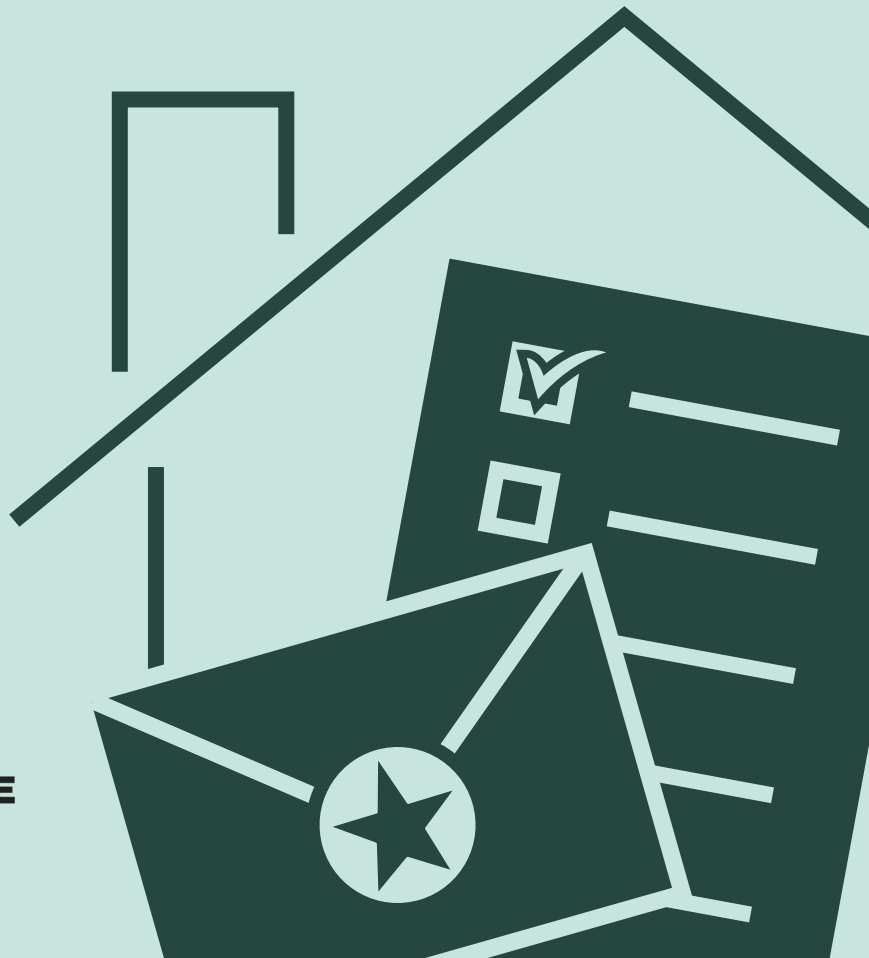

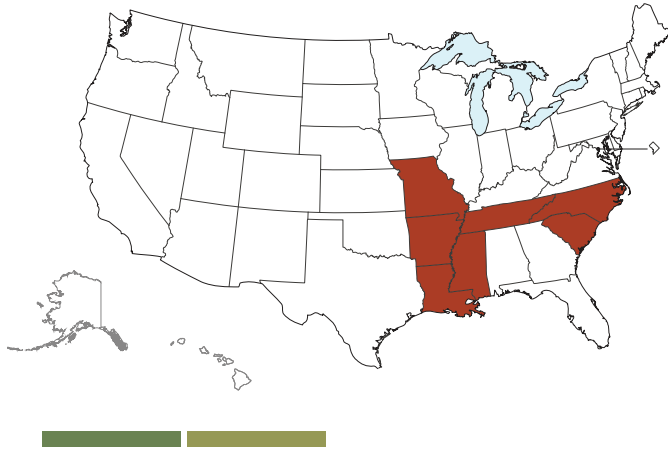

## Voting in Oklahoma



Oklahoma has more than 2.1 million registered voters in its 77 counties, ranging from 1,404 in Harmon County to 408,000 in Oklahoma County. In the 2018 election, 6 percent of Oklahomans voted absentee. This ranged from less than 1 percent in Johnston County to 9.7 percent in Oklahoma County. Of that election's 6,353 poll workers, 83 percent were age 60 or older—an age group at a higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19.

One-third of Oklahoma's registered voters cast ballots in the March 3 presidential primary—a dip compared with the 2016 primary turnout but 10 percentage points higher than 2012's. Nearly 4 percent of voters cast votes by mail—approximately twice as many as in the 2016 presidential primary. In preparation for the June 30 primary, Oklahoma's state legislature passed a bill reducing the requirements for absentee voter verification and waiving the need for notary or witness signature so long as voters provide proof of identification.
