



Sage-grouse numbers have plummeted with the destruction of the bird's natural habitat, particularly in Washington.





#### TRAFFIC FATALITIES IN CASCADIA




Cascadia's urban areas, along with southwestern British Columbia, excel at limiting the risk of car travel. Map by CommEn Space.


